

1.Introduction

- Agriculture can help generate the much-needed jobs in Africa's growing population
- Several studies have explored youth aspirations towards farming to support this dominant narrative
- ➤ However, little is known about the intergenerational factors and actors shaping youth aspirations, in particular the role of gender differences
- ➤ RESEARCH QUESTION: To what extent do parent's aspirations as well as other factors and actors shape youth aspirations?

3.Methods

- Field research June and August 2019 in rural Zambia
- Study adopted mixed-method of data collection that follows a unique "whole family" approach





Fig 2. Actors' influence on youth aspirations towards farming by gender

- ➤ Survey with 348 respondents (Fig 2) made up of parents (household heads and spouses) and adolescents (boys and girls)

4.Results

- Parents strongly shape children's aspirations and are more influential than siblings, peers, or media
- Male youth are more likely to envision a career in farming (full or part-time)
- Female youth are more likely to envision a non-farming-based livelihood
- Farm satisfaction and desired place of residence (rural or urban) are significant predictors of youth envisioning a career in farming
- ➤ Parent's farm characteristics such as degree of mechanization are also associated with aspirations in agriculture

Actors influence youth aspirations towards farming by gender

- ➤ Study recommends a "whole family" approach, which acknowledges the influential role of parents, for policies and programs for rural youth in agriculture.
- > Study also reinforces the importance of a stronger focus on gender dimensions of youth participation in agriculture.
