Local Logistics and Transport for African Indigenous Vegetables in sub-Saharan Africa



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Motivation and objective

- •In sub-Saharan African countries, African indigenous vegetables (AIVs) are needed for nutrition and income
- Post-harvest losses affect nutrition and income
- •Local logistics and transport are prerequisites to minimizing post-harvest losses
- •The study objective was to assess the nature and actors of the AlVs' local logistics and transport

Methods

- Focus group discussions (6), interviews (40); farmers, traders and transporters in Kenya (Fig.1)
- MAXQDA, analyzed the nature and actors in local logistics and transport

Results

- Unreliable logistics and transport services for 20 years
- Farmers have longer periods in AIV activities (30) other actors < 10 years

• Key actors in AIVs logistics and transportation are diverse depending on the stages along the supply chain





Figure 2: Actors in the AIV supply chain
